

CTR PRAYER PROJECT

Matthew 9:6-But so that you may know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins--then He said to the paralytic, "Get up, pick up your bed and go home." (Based on a sermon by Pastor Larry Van Laar, Sun Valley Church, Gilbert, AZ)

We have all heard the story before: The paralytic's friends, unable to get inside the house so Jesus could heal him, made a hole in the thatched roof and lowered him to the floor in front of the Preacher. But this story leaves a lot of unanswered questions, for me at least. Did the paralytic want to be healed? Why did his friends insist on interrupting Jesus' sermon, when they could have waited for the crowd to disperse?

What sins had this man committed? Why were the scribes so upset by a healing? Why did this occur in Capernaum, when Jesus could have healed a paralytic anywhere in Galilee? Perhaps you have some questions of your own. Well, I got most of my questions answered last Sunday, so I want to share my new insights with you. We don't know if the paralytic wanted to be healed, or wanted anything to do with Jesus for that matter, but Matthew gives us a clue: "Seeing their faith". It was the faith of the men who carried their friend to the roof. Whom do we know who won't or can't get to Jesus on their own? Who is dependent on our faith to get them to Christ for atonement and salvation? Most of us never connect this story with the one that precedes it in the Bible: Jesus had spent the day casting demons out of two Gadarenes on the other side of the Sea of Galilee. Likely exhausted, He could have refused to preach or heal anyone, but He knew how important this teaching was to the people of Capernaum, a town where He was well known as a Hebrew itinerant rabbi. The Jews believed that physical ailments were caused by the person's sins. If Jesus had told the paralytic to get up and go home, it would have been just another healing; but by telling him his sins were forgiven, He was able to show the scribes and others that He truly was the Messiah, sent from the Father. The paralytic was a sinner, but his paralysis was the perfect opportunity for the Son of God to reveal Himself to unbelievers and be glorified in the presence of doubting Jews. Telling the paralytic his sins were forgiven opened the opportunity for Jesus to prove His power and authority as God in the flesh, and it enabled the paralytic with atrophied muscles to immediately walk home on his own, and have a testimony to his healing to share with all he encountered. What disabilities do each of us have that can be God's opportunity for revelation? Someone else's faith may depend on our surrender of them to God for His use.

Praying in One Accord-When even our disabilities are in one accord with God's purposes, miracles can happen.

Accord Prayer-Lord Christ, we know You can heal anyone; help us offer our infirmities for Your purpose and Your glory, no matter what the outcome may be. In Your Name we pray. Amen.

Prayer of Thanksgiving-Omniscient and Beneficent Father, thank You for Your Word, which enlightens us, enabling us to see Your plan and Your purpose for our lives; thank You for glorifying Your Son, and us in Him. Amen.
